

Local Initiatives

In Germany, the number of male workers in ECEC has increased to an all-time high of more than 53,000 men in 2021, making up 7.5% of the ECEC workforce (see adjacent graph). However, the German government does not support strategies for gender balance and diversity on a national level anymore. Only two cities are constantly funding regional initiatives for recruitment and support of male workers. A national meeting of coordinators of working groups for men in ECEC took place in May 2022 and will continue to collaborate.



Children's Perspectives of Their Teachers

Following our first successful SIG book initiative, we have organized a second major research project, this time on the topic of children's perspectives on their ECEC teachers and caregivers who identify as men and women. This endeavor involves 22 researchers from nine countries around the world. The researchers are working together in country teams to learn how the children view their caregivers and teachers, using a gender lens. We began our work last year when we collaboratively developed our data collection tools. This year we hope to complete the data collection, and to begin analysis of the data. Our goal is to produce a book that will include a case study from each of the countries participating in the study.

Early Care and the Role of Men

ECaRoM is a two-year European funded project that aims at promoting the concept of caring masculinities so that children, and especially boys, are taught about the importance of care for themselves, others, and the environment. The Project also teaches how care professions are addressed in ECEC services and primary schools, and how this impacts their further educational/professional choices. https://ecarom.eu/ Project partners in Austria, Bulgaria, Germany, Italy, Lithuania, and Slovenia have recently published national reports, which are summarized in a transnational report: Bernacci, Erika, Di Grigoli, Antonio R. & Hrženjak, Majda, Humer, Živa (Hrsg.)
